City Manager Jeff Drobney presented a Resolution authorizing the Mayor to sign an Intergovernmental Agreement (IGA) with Cobb County for Animal Control Services.

This IGA was discussed at the last set of meetings and was contingent on the adoption of the Chapter 10 amendments in the Kennesaw Code of Ordinances that was passed at the December 1, 2025, City Council meeting.

With Council consensus, Mayor Easterling recommended placing the item on the Consent Agenda for the regular meeting.

B. SPLOST: 2028 Proposed Projects List

Consideration for approval of the proposed projects for the 2028 Special Purpose Local Option Sales Tax (SPLOST) referendum.

Assistant City Manager Marty Hughes presented the proposed projects for the 2028 Special Purpose Local Option Sales Tax (SPLOST) referendum, which Cobb County has scheduled for the public vote in November 2026. Based on the committee's evaluations, the proposed project list reflects the City's priorities and needs for the next six years. Mr. Hughes noted that due to legal timelines established by the County, the City is required to submit its proposed project list by the end of the month.

Mayor Pro Tem Ferris asked what revenue amount the County has projected for the City over the six-year SPLOST program. Mr. Hughes responded that the estimated amount is \$46,771,381. Mayor Pro Tem Ferris stated that he does not support the inclusion of a new City Hall building on the proposed list and would have preferred additional funding allocated for paving. Mr. Hughes explained that the Public Works Director served on the committee and had extensive discussions with the City Manager regarding infrastructure needs, including paving, and noted that the City also utilizes State resources to help fund those projects.

Mayor Pro Tem Ferris also asked about public hearings for the proposed list. Mr. Hughes shared that he attended a meeting with the County the previous week and that Commissioner Gambrill has expressed interest in holding a joint meeting with the City. Mayor Pro Tem Ferris emphasized the importance of providing the public with opportunities to offer input and suggest additional projects and stated his hope that several iterations of the draft list would be developed based on public feedback.

Councilmember Jones expressed concern that the proposed \$2 million allocation for stormwater infrastructure upgrades may be insufficient and stated his desire to see additional funding dedicated to that area. Mr. Hughes responded that the committee made every effort to allocate limited resources across a wide range of projects.

Councilmember Gutierrez-Leon asked when Tier 2 projects would begin. Mr. Hughes explained that Tier 1 projects would be completed first and that Tier 2 projects would move forward only if funding remains available. He added that the amount of remaining funding would require further discussion among staff, the Mayor, and Council.

Mayor Pro Tem Ferris stated that project cost estimates are best-case projections and noted that experience has shown estimates to be conservative and not always reflective of true costs. He expressed concern that rising costs could impact the City's ability to complete all Tier 1 projects within the six-year timeframe and suggested that funding adjustments may be necessary. Mr. Hughes responded that the City has generally done a solid job of staying within budget using estimates that are six to eight years old.

Mayor Pro Tem Ferris concluded by emphasizing the importance of reaching as many residents as possible and ensuring ample opportunities for public engagement.

Mayor Easterling stated that once we receive public input, we can adjust as necessary. In order to continue meetings with the County we must submit the current list by year's end. We can then hold town halls for public input.

Business License Manager Mariyah Nall presented a retail package alcohol license for beer, wine, and Sunday sales for Worth the Wait, Inc. d/b/a Big Pie in the Sky Pizzeria located at 2090 Baker Road, Unit A103 Kennesaw. The applicant has completed the required alcohol workshop per section 6-69. Signs have been posted, and it has been property advertised per Section 6-36. The current application and background check results are on file. A distance survey completed by a certified surveyor indicates the business is within 300 feet of a property line or structure as required by section 6-42 or 6-43. All other distance requirements have been verified. Section 6-42 states that the Mayor and Council can waive the distance requirement if the quiet enjoyment of the premises by the residents thereof is not affected.

A. Resolution: Professional Services for Cobb International Boulevard Pavement Reclamation Project

Consideration for approval of a Resolution approving Patterson & Dewar Engineers's proposal for professional services for the Cobb International Boulevard Pavement Reclamation Project.

Public Works Director Ricky Stewart presented a proposal from City Engineer Patterson & Dewar for civil engineering services related to the Cobb International Boulevard pavement reclamation project. He noted that this project is part of the congressional earmark grants received for the construction phase and that design services are required to advance the project under the federal grants. The estimated cost for design services is \$285,950.

Mayor Pro Tem Ferris commented on the \$10 million SPLOST allocation for improvements to Cobb International Boulevard and inquired how the two funding sources would be coordinated. Mr. Stewart explained that the intent is to leverage both SPLOST funding and the congressional earmark grants to complete the project.

With Council consensus, Mayor Easterling recommended placing the item on the Consent Agenda for the regular meeting.

A. Discussion Only: Residential Occupancy and Family Definition

Director of Planning and Zoning Chanelle Campbell stated that Council requested staff review the implications of updating the number of unrelated individuals permitted in a single-family dwelling. Under the Unified Development Code, a family is defined as persons related by blood, marriage, or adoption, or up to three unrelated persons living as a single housekeeping unit. Staff consulted with Building Services and the Cobb Fire Marshal regarding occupancy requirements.

Georgia Life Safety Code allows a single family plus two unrelated occupants; a unit with four unrelated occupants is considered a boarding house. Director of Building Services Scott Banks noted that boarding house designations require fire review and can impact street parking.

Councilmembers asked clarifying questions regarding basements rented to unrelated individuals, personal caretakers, and unmarried couples. Staff confirmed that as long as no more than three unrelated persons reside in a home, the boarding house designation does not apply, and caretakers are permitted. Parking complaints often trigger enforcement cases, which average 12–14 annually. Conversions to boarding houses involve additional building and fire code requirements.

Ms. Campbell stated that staff recommends leaving the current definition of family unchanged.

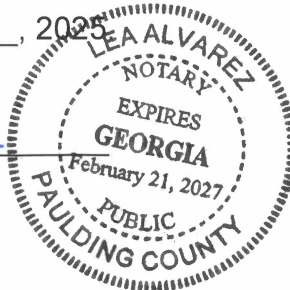

Chanelle Campbell, Director of Planning and Zoning, presented an ordinance to amend the Unified Development Code, Appendix A, Section 4.04.05, "Standards for Home Occupations," as submitted by the City of Kennesaw. Ms. Campbell noted that staff received five land use permit applications this year, including two renewal applications. During a review of the process, staff identified opportunities to improve efficiency and provide greater clarity for applicants and the public.

As a result, staff proposed amendments to Section 4.04.05 of the Unified Development Code. The proposed changes include clarifying the distinction between Type A and Type B home occupations in Section 4.04.05.B; explaining parking requirements for off-site employees in Section 4.04.05.C.4; updating prohibited uses in Section 4.04.05.E.4; and adding an administrative renewal process in Section 4.04.05.F. The majority of the amendments focus on the latter section and are intended to streamline the renewal process.

Additionally, at the request of Councilmember Orochena during the work session, staff revisited the current limitation allowing only one Type A (virtual office) application per dwelling unit. Following further research and discussion, staff recommended removing this restriction. A cap will remain in place for Type B applications, which follow a more stringent review process and require consideration by the Mayor and Council.

Ms. Campbell stated that the process will continue to be monitored using feedback from applicants as well as the Mayor and Council.

adversely affected and the granting of such a license shall not have any adverse effect on the private residence.

Annie Louise Brooks was five years old, and was looking forward to attending school after Christmas. She made sure Santa knew she had helped carry firewood for her mother. She asked for a rocking chair, story book, fruits, nuts, candy, and chewing gum. Last but not least, Martha Glenn Lewis (a four-year-old downtown resident) wanted a “kiddie Car,” a doll, fruits, and “just anything else that you can bring me.”
