Floor Open for Public Comment

ANDREW BRAMLETT [City Resident]: Mr. Bramlett delivered a presentation on Kennesaw history during World War II. In 1942, the Kennesaw City Council approved a blackout ordinance for air raids. The ordinance outlined the processes and procedures to be followed in the event of an air raid on the city. Residents were required to turn off all flashlights, electric lights, fires, heaters, radios, and anything else that might be visible from the sky. **[See EXHIBIT A]**

SAMUEL RUSCH [City Resident]: Rusch began by thanking council members Madelyn

Orochena and Antonio Jones for making time to meet with him. He advised council members Tracey Viars, Jonathon Bothers, and Anthony Gutierrez-Leon that he contacted each of them twice requesting a meeting, and that he would appreciate hearing back from them. He stated that Assistant Manager Marty Hughes refuses to answer his questions anymore, and indicated that he does not take him seriously. Mayor Easterling requested that Rusch address him directly and to refrain from referencing individual city personnel. Rusch inquired as to why and the Mayor responded that public comments are directed to Mayor and Council, and that he would like Rusch to direct his comments to him. Rusch asked the Mayor when was the last time he visited Woodland (Acres) Park. He recited Section 66-2, subsection C-1, which states it *shall be unlawful for any person to do any of the following in a public park or on public property: create or maintain a nuisance as defined by state law or by the Code of Ordinances, Kennesaw, Georgia, or pose a danger or threat to the public.* He questioned the chained entryway to Woodland (Acres) Park and the safety of the sloped access point next to the driveway. He commented that the land to the left of the driveway is private property with access only available along the right side of the driveway. Rusch asked the Mayor if the sloping land to the right of the driveway entering into Woodland (Acres) Park was "ADA compliant." According to Rusch, the parks department or public works lopped off a sapling that was blocking the entranceway to the park, and it had created an injurious situation. He asked the Mayor why the City did not install a bollard or a gate in place of a chain to prevent illegal parking while maintaining a safe entryway that does not force people to commit an act of trespassing on private property or fall and hurt themselves. He created a seeclickfix.com work order for the non-operable light by the old basketball court at Woodland (Acres) Park and asked why the city would not provide a power source. He commented on the difficulty of having a "breathe easy zone" sign erected, and that the city is more concerned with prioritizing parking than preventing the spread of second-hand smoke in city parks. He asked that the remainder of his time be used to explain the City's rationale for the decisions it has made concerning Woodland (Acres) Park.

LAURA LYONS [City Resident]: Mrs. Lyons commented on the need for children to access parks and green spaces. Community parks in downtown Kennesaw allow children an opportunity to run, explore and play in a safe environment. As the owner of Fresh on Forrest, Lyons has had the opportunity to speak with neighbors about Woodland Park, and many have asked when the park will reopen. She believes the park will offer recreational alternatives for families and senior citizens. The chain at the entrance has caused confusion when public spaces should be welcoming to all in the community.

JORY LYONS [City Resident]: Mr. Lyons thanked Council member Madelyn Orochena for staying late last week to speak with him and his family. He commented that he had a disappointing encounter with a council member and the assistant city manager at Woodland (Acres) Park last week. Lyons voiced his displeasure with seeclickfix.com. When he creates a work order through the system to address broken curbs and damaged sidewalks, his request bounces from one local jurisdiction to another. Cobb County has responded to his broken curbs and damaged sidewalks work orders and

advised him that the City of Kennesaw was responsible for providing service. He commented that he took photographs that were sent to the Council by Samuel Rusch showing what Woodland (Acres) Park used to look like. According to Lyons, he submitted a seeclickfix.com work order to address the park access point to the right of the driveway entering Woodland (Acres) Park, and that the access point was deemed unsafe for the public by city personnel.

ANNETTE CONN [City Resident]: Mrs. Conn stated that she resides at 2574 Dobbs Drive, NW, and Woodland (Acres) Park is located directly behind her property. On Friday, May 15, 2026, Mrs. Conn had the opportunity to speak with Mr. Vick True, who previously resided at 2574 Dobbs Drive, NW. She stated that she wanted to dispel any rumors concerning Woodland (Acres) Park that could be found on the internet. She stated that the City of Kennesaw installed the chain and lock blocking the driveway to Woodland (Acres) Park. She also commented that, according to Vick True, the City granted him permission to add his own lock so that he could use the restricted driveway to access his boat. He was also allowed to utilize PVC pipes to prevent people from sitting or walking along the chain. Mrs. Conn wanted to state for the record that her husband, Wayne Conn, did not install a chain or has ever blocked anyone in the community from accessing Woodland (Acres) Park.

KENNESAW HISTORY

Blackout Ordinance

World War II had profound impacts on the local community. Many Kennesaw residents served in the war, and the Bell Bomber Plant in Marietta brought new jobs to the area. During the war, however, Americans were unclear if it would stay in Europe and the Pacific or if war would ever come close to home. With this in mind, many communities took precautions, and Kennesaw was no exception.

In August 1942, the Kennesaw Mayor and Council approved a blackout ordinance for air raids. The ordinance mentioned the Citizens Defense Corps, a federal office created during World War II, and is likely the corps played some role in drafting its language.

In case of an air raid, the bells at the Baptist and Methodist church were designated as signals. Residents would turn off all electric lights, fires, heaters, radios, flashlights, or anything else that might be visible from the sky. All vehicles, except for those connected to civil defense, were prohibited during an air raid. Last but not least, air raid wardens and other positions were created, but it is sadly not known if these roles were ever filled.

Special Ordinance covering "Blackouts".

Be it enacted that upon the sounding of Air Raid Alarm Signals for a "Blackout" namely by the ringing of Church Bells at the Baptist and Methodist Churches and at the School House all persons within the incorporate limits of the City of Kennesaw shall immediately blackout all lights upon their premises. It shall be unlawful for any person to let any ray of light that is made from any kind of lamp, or fire from fire place, heater, radio, flash light, or any other form of light produced in any way be seen from without of said premises during the period of a "Blackout", and until the all clear signal has been sounded in the same manner by the ringing of the Church Bells. Be it further enacted that it shall be unlawful for any person or persons to travel in any vehicle in any way or direction within the incorporate limits of the City of Kennesaw during the period of a Blackout called by the City of Kennesaw, or County, or State at any time except such official Cars, Trucks, and Ambulances as designated by the Civilian Defense Corps, and their lights shall be properly blackened or dimmed with Standard Blackout Equipment. Upon the sounding of an Air Raid Alarm all parties in Vehicles of any kind unless otherwise connected with the Civilian Defense Corps will immediately pull over to the curb, Stop Motor, and cut out all lights until the all clear signal has been sounded.

Be it further enacted that during the period of a Blackout or the State of Georgia for practice or real raids, it shall be unlawful for any person to be out on the Streets, Sidewalks or yards except the Air Raid Wardens, Auxillary Firemen, Auxillary-Police and other parties that have been duly appointed by the Civilian Defense Corps.

Any person or persons, firm or Corporation violating this Ordinance or the spirit of it, by word, deed, or action, or allowing it to be violated at his or her home, on his or her premises, or his or her place of business shall be fined not exceeding Twenty Five Dollars or confined to Jail not exceeding Twenty Five Days.

Passed at a meeting of the Mayor and Council of the City of Kennesaw this the 27th day of August 1942.


